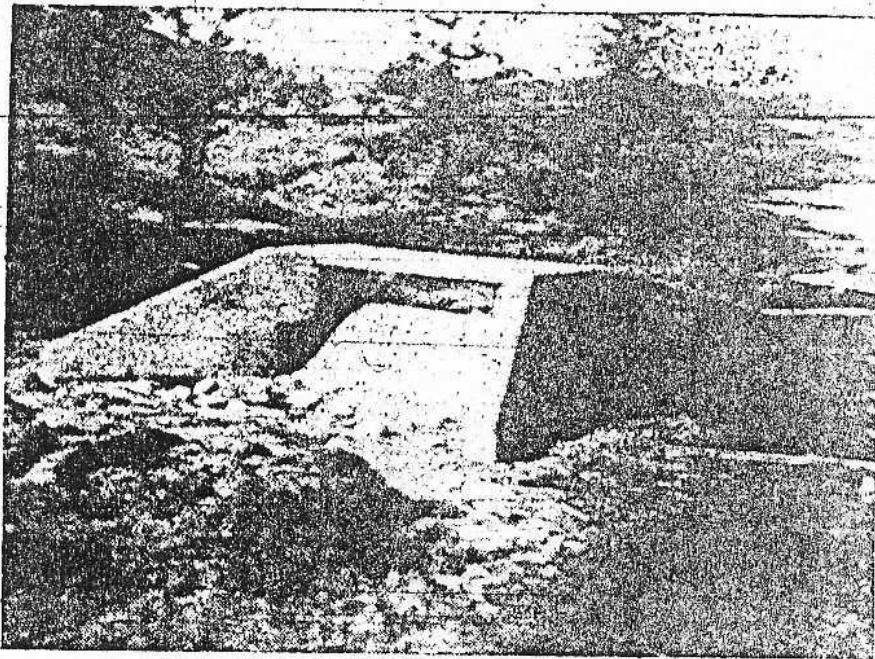


Wasteway at Moore's Lake Completed



READY FOR CONCRETE ON FLUME HEAD AT MOORE'S LAKE DAM

POURING EXPECTED TO START FRIDAY MORNING; WATER GATE ARRIVES BROKEN FACTORY AWAITS STEEL

Forms are in and pouring of concrete is expected to start Friday on the headwall and sluiceway at the southern end of Moore's lake, being built to form the gateway to a long flume. The flume will carry water of the lakes directly to a power house on the lower mill pond, where it will be used to generate electricity to turn the wheels in the new Ford carburetor plant being built in Milford.

The head wall has an over-all length of about 50 feet, and is approximately 13 1/2 feet high. A ten-foot opening between two sections of the L-shaped walls provides passage of the water into the flume, and in this opening will be installed a large water gate. By this means the level of Moore's lake can be controlled, as well as the amount drawn into the flume. Footings for the head wall were run last Friday and Saturday. An effort will be made to complete pouring in one or two days.

The water gate, a massive iron contrivance, which weighs over two tons, is in Milford, shipped here by rail from Massachusetts. A bit of misfortune has occurred, however, as in transit one of the large iron arms was snapped, which will have to be repaired or replaced with a new part.

Excavating machines have been moved from lower end of Moore's lake to the dam and spillway site, at the north end to begin earthwork at this point when weather is favorable. All frost must be out of the ground when the tamped clay core of the dam is put in.

Concrete work on the waterway was finished ten days ago, and a photo of it appears in this issue of the Times.

Work at the factory building has been practically at a standstill for ten days and will be so until steel arrives, according to Karl Sanford, construction engineer. Steel has been ordered, is now being fabricated with promise of delivery by next week, he said.

It is reported that the Ford Motor Company is getting ready to start the power house project, and will ask bids.
