FIRST STEEL ARRIVES AND SET AT NEW FORD PLANT HERE

COMES TUESDAY; ONLY MATERIAL FOR FIVE BAYS TO BE SHIPPED AT PRESENT

PETTIBONE DAM BLDG. BEGUN

Steel began arriving Tuesday for the new Ford plant in Milford, and Wednesday workmen started assembling the framework of the building. Steel for the dam is here, and is all that will arrive for the present, according to Karl Sanford, in charge of construction for the Albrecht Company. Work now going on is for the power plant and rear of the factory. Steel for front sections has not been detailed yet, he said.

A large power crane for handling steel was brought here Monday in anticipation of the arrival of material.

Building of the earthen dam at the head of Moore's lake was begun this week, by the Buthene Company, who have a power shovel and a crane busily engaged. Earth for the dam is being secured by tearing down a bank along the west side of Pettibone creek.

The crane picks up the material from a stock pile where it has been deposited by the shovel and swings it into position along the dam. The filled bucket of the crane also is used to tamp down the earth. Work now is on the west side of the new concrete spillway and later the east side, where Pettibone creek courses, will be closed off. When the dam is finished the water will be allowed to fill up Moore's lake, now drawn down as far as possible, up to its new level. It will take several months for the bottom of newly flooded land to properly seal against seepage. While this process is going on, it is expected that the flume will go in and a low water period will prevail in existing Milford ponds, below Moore's lake. Headwork and gate to the flume entrance is about completed.

Old Newspaper Tells of Early Milford; Writer

In looking through household effects in the former Johnston home on Commerce St. last Saturday, E. V. Johnston of Detroit found a relic of outstanding interest, which he turned over to the Times for perusal. This was a copy of the old Pontiac Gazette of Jan. 19, 1877, and its chief interest is a "History of Milford", written by Henderson Crawford for the 1876 Fourth of July celebration of the Oakland County Pioneer Association at Pontiac. The writer, as the old-times well remember, was not only the "literary man" of the village, but the typical school master, under whose tutelage in a private school many men and women laid the foundation for later successful careers. He tells of the early settlers and where they located, and relates some interesting anecdotes as he heard them direct from the pioneers.

As the article has so much value to anyone who has known Milford and descendants of those early settlers, we shall hope to publish it serially, as space permits.
