MILFORD

MOORE'S LAKE NEARLY UP TO NEW LEVEL; IS 20 INCHES HIGHER

NEW DAM ON PETTIBONE CREEK DIVERTS WATER; FLOODS LARGE AREA

IS PART OF FORD DEVELOPMENT

Millfordites, familiar with Moore's lake region who might visit the scene today, will note considerable change since last fall, wrought by the Ford Motor Company as part of their Millford development. The dam at the head of the lake, blocking off Pettibone Creek has been completed, and the lake is now nearly at its new level, about 20 inches higher than formerly. This has had the effect of flooding much of the area along the stream's course, north of the lake, making in effect a much larger body of water, with potential possibilities for fishing and boating enthusiasts. The Moore's Lake part of the Ford development has now been about completed, with finishing of the dam, at north end, and the headwall at the lower end. The road at the latter point has been raised about five feet, graded to a width of 20 feet, with sloping sides, to be sodded. When landscaped this should be a beauty spot.

Men are pushing work at the factory, and steel workers finished Tuesday night. They were to have finished last week. Carpenters are building forms for concrete work on the floor, and have started the roof construction.

The Poe Well Drilling Co. are boring test holes to locate a well near the factory site. Their first attempt to locate water was a failure, the hole going down 115 feet. At 104 feet they struck bed rock.
