**DRILLING FOR NEW
12-INCH WELL AT
LOCAL FORD SITE**

TO BE USED TO SUPPLY WATER FOR AIR CONDITIONING OF NEW BUILDING

STEEL WORKERS BACK

Well drillers are sinking a 12-inch well at the Ford factory site, starting work the fore part of the week. The well will be driven to about a 100-foot depth, according to the drillers. It is located at the rear of the lot of what was formerly the William Marble place. Several test holes for water were put down earlier in the summer and this was revealed as the most likely spot. The water will be used solely for the air conditioning service, with which the plant will be equipped.

Installation of the ventilation system has been started, workmen now putting an air conduit in the basement.

A section of the engine room on the first floor has been changed somewhat from the original design, requiring some alterations in the steel floor beams. Steel workers have been here this week making the changes. Superintendent Karl Sanford states that it will be August 1 before the concrete will be poured to finish this section of the building.
