

INTO SHALLOW WATER RESULTS IN SERIOUS INJURY

NECK FOR TOM WHITE-
HORN WHEN HE JUMPS
FROM BRIDGE

UNIVERSITY HOSPITAL

Whitehorn, about 21 years old, a resident of New Hudson, Mich., is in the University Hospital, Ann Arbor, Mich., after being taken following a swimmer's accident, Tuesday night, at the bridge over the Huron river on West 10th street. Whitehorn has two vertebrae fractured in the neck and is lying on his back from the shoulders down. He will recover or be permanently disabled is not yet determined. Whitehorn, with a number of New Hudson companions, was playing tag on the bridge over a swimming hole. He dived from the platform of the bridge into 10 feet of water, striking his head on the bottom. The accident occurred about 7:30. Dr. Bragg, of the University Hospital, was called and rendered what assistance possible and Whitehorn was taken to the Richardson ambulance to the hospital.

SEEK 500 GALLON WELL TO SERVICE PLANT

Good progress is being made on the big well at the Ford plant, and the casing is down about 70 feet. The well will be drilled to a depth of about 100 feet, and is of 12 inch casing. Water bearing sand favorable to a good well exists from the 50 foot level down to the 100 foot level, and it is thought that it may be the same water vein which turned out to be such a good producer for the village in their new well at the power house. A 50 foot screen is being put in now, which will give the maximum capacity the depth of the strata. Ford men are hoping for a good well, which will produce at least 500 gallons per minute. The well will service air conditioning equipment only.

Changes in the steel work under way last week have been made, and forms and reinforcing steel have been put in on the section of the main floor yet to be poured at the plant. There are pipes and conduits for the various electrical and plumbing services yet to be installed, and they are a legion. It is predicted that it will be at least a week before the floor is finally poured, but when it is, all hands will rejoice. Completing of the floor means that the job can be speeded up again. The change was made to provide the foundation and fittings for a second auxiliary engine, when original plans called for one. It is said that a single engine will be put in at first, the other added if desired.
