## Death of Dan Casterton Occurs in Racine, Wis.

W. J. Casterton, of Norfolk, Va., sends the Times a clipping from a Racine, Wis., paper, carrying news of the death of his brother, Daniel H. Casterton, at the home in Racine on Thursday morning, August 11. Mr. Casterton had been ill since January, 1937, and funeral and burial services occurred on Saturday, August 13.  
Daniel Casterton was born in Milford, Dec. 5, 1876, and in 1895 went to Racine to enter Casterton's Business College, operated by his brother. Following his course there, he took a position with the Horlick Company, and through business training and natural ability he was promoted from one position to another, until he reached department manager, a position he held for many years and up to the time of his death. Mr. Casterton was a Spanish-American war veteran and a member of the Masonic order. He leaves his wife, one son and three brothers, Albert and Arthur of Detroit, Walter, of Norfolk, two sisters, Esther of Chelsea and Florence, of Detroit.

## MILFORD SCHOOLS OPEN FOR CLASSES SEPT. 7

### TEACHERS' MEETINGS CALLED FOR TUESDAY; BAND AND ART ADDED TO COURSES

Regular classes in the Milford School will open on Wednesday morning, September 7. Pupils will be registered and high school classes organized during the forenoon. School will continue throughout the day on Wednesday and regular lessons will be given out in all classes. Free text books will be given out at the first meeting of each class.  
A series of teachers' meetings will be held on Tuesday, September 6. Band and Art as regular high school subjects have been added to the curriculum this year. Miss Frieda Anderson, home economics, and Phillip Had-drill, music, are the only new teachers on the high school staff.  
The seventh grade home room will be on the first floor of the elementary building with Mr. Stevenson in charge. The eighth grade will continue to use the mathematics room with Miss Fowler in charge. The senior home room will be continued the same as last year with Mr. Garrett in charge.  
Miss Lucille Derby, first grade, Miss Aileen MacDonald, third grade, and Miss Vera Mae Meier, fifth grade will be the new teachers in the elementary school. A regular schedule of classes will be run in the elementary school on Wednesday when free text books will be given out.  
Mothers of kindergarten children are requested to meet with Miss Hoff-stetter in the kindergarten room at 2:00 p. m. on Friday, September 2. This will be the third year that the teacher has met with the mothers of kindergarten children before the opening of school. Meetings have proved very beneficial in the past, both to the mother and to the school.

## FIRST STEP WILL BE DRAINING LOWER MILL POND TO ALLOW CONSTRUCTION FOR PILING

### BUILDING LINE 3 MONTHS' JOB

The Lorne Plumbing & Heating Company, successful bidders for installation of the long pipe line which will connect Moore's Lake and the Pettibone powerhouse on the lower mill pond, lost no time in getting started, and moved onto the job here Friday with first equipment. Work started in earnest Tuesday morning, and by this Thursday is well under way. The pipe line is part of the Ford Motor Company's development at Milford, and this, with the power plant, is estimated to cost in the neighborhood of a quarter million dollars.  
First actual work to be undertaken is the draining of the lower mill pond. This will be entirely drained down to the natural creek level, to permit laying the line across the pond. This is being accomplished by digging a trench across the newly-made fill, along the south bank, and allowing the water to flow out and into the old mill race. When the work is completed, the pond will be allowed to refill.  
The pipe line from powerhouse to the lake is 3,400 linear feet, and runs almost due north. This fact seems hardly possible, but a glance at the blueprint, and a second look over the territory will confirm its truth. Pipe is made of steel, in 40-foot lengths, and each length weighs something over 5 1/2 tons. Joints will be welded, and the pipe covered inside and out with an asphaltic compound to prevent corrosion. The pipe is 18 inches inside diameter and steel is one-half inch thick. It is being made especially for this job and about five weeks will be required before delivery. Through the ponds, the pipe will be supported on concrete piling, and across the lower ponds there will be 84 piles about 12 feet apart; also 74 concrete collars through which the pipe passes. Overland, the line will be laid in a trench, at an average depth of eight feet. At the deepest point, not far from Moore's Lake, a ditch about 12 feet deep will be required.  
A big excavating machine was brought here Tuesday morning, its first job cutting the 200-foot channel as an outlet for the lower mill pond, and it is expected that the water will be entirely drained by this Friday. Work will then start on construction of piling.  
In Milford while the construction job is in progress will be C. W. Lerpere, contractor's representative, and Ross Whitman, superintendent. About three months will be required to complete the pipe line.  
Work on the factory building has been showing good progress this week, with a large crew of bricklayers busily engaged in laying up walls around the power station. About a week's work remains for the bricklayers.  
Several other activities are in full swing, a large crew of Ford workmen from the Rouge plant coming to the plant daily to install the big boilers recently arrived. A quantity of other machinery has arrived and is stored about the plant, and still more machinery is waiting at Northville for transfer to Milford.
