MP. FORD PROYIDES SOCIAL SERVICE INSTRUCTION HERE

ARRANGEMENTS MADE FOR TWO CLASSES EACH THURSDAY 160 ACCOMMODATED

Milford schools are fortunate in that they have been included to receive a series of social training classes sponsored by Henry Ford, and made available to those areas where the Ford Motor Company has operating interests. The classes will begin next. Thursday, November 3 and will be held each Thursday afternoon from 2 to 4 p.m. The training is elective, and open to all senior high school students, except that membership is limited to 160. Two classes will be held each afternoon, under the direction of Benjamin Lovette, who will have instructors with him. In the morning, they are holding classes at Plymouth coming to Milford for the afternoons.

This type of training is one of the things that Mr. Ford does for school children and communities where his company has interests, and over 10,-000 youth have been benefitted by it, mostly in Detroit areas. Many city schools have applied for this social science instruction, and are now on the waiting list. The board of education at its last meeting voted to accept this training for Milford schools.

Parents, school board members and others interested are invited to visit school-on-November-3-and-any-other-Thursday, to learn about social science training.

Grade school pupils will be taken on an educational tour of Greenfield village, Edison Institute and the Ford Rotunda next week, guests of the Ford Motor Company. Ford busses will be sent out. Tuesday for 6th graders, and 10 fifth grade pupils, to make up a load of fifty, and on Wednesday fourth and fifth graders make the trip. On Thursday third grade pupils will be taken.
