**PIPELINE OPERATIONS PROGRESS**

It will not be too long now before the Milford plant of the Ford Motor Company, latest addition to the several smaller units of that giant manufacturing organization will be turning out carburetors. Is the indication of the past week. Already it is reported that one or two machines have been placed in operation, and more equipment is being added to that already in the building every day. The building itself is nearing completion, and this week the contractor's "office," a temporary wooden building was removed from the grounds. Construction offices are now located in the former Wm. Marble house.

The old gravel bins and other outside evidences of construction will soon be moved.

Landscaping continues to be one of the main items of outside work, and this week shrubbery is being set out around the grounds.

Every day sees a large number of men visit the plant, seeking employment, and many men have already been put on. Ford men at the plant state that their application lists have been filled, and that men from Milford and immediate vicinity will have the first opportunity for employment. Men who will be permanently at the Milford plant, have been given the new Milford badges, similar to those in use at the Rouge, and other Ford plants.

**FLUME PROGRESSING RAPIDLY**

Good weather has favored building of the long flume, and already the area from the lower mill pond to the P. M. right-of-way has been completed, and the trench filled. Pipe has been laid through the upper pond, and excavating machines are preparing the ditch from the upper pond north. Through the lowland, north of Summit street, several concrete "saddles" similar to those used in the lower pond will be constructed to support the pipe.

As yet nothing definite is known here regarding building of the two power stations, one on the lower pond and the other on the Huron.
