**DAILY INCREASE OF ACTIVITY PREVAILS AT FORD PLANT**

**MEN, MACHINES ADDED AS FAST AS PRACTICAL; PRODUCTION UP TO 1500 UNITS**

Humming wheels at the newly opened Ford Carburetor factory at Milford testify to increased activity as the plant gets into its second week of operation. More machinery and equipment is being added daily and employment increased as the need for more men arises with two shifts working each day. Production has been speeded up from initial operations by 100% with approximately 1500 units per day as the present output.

Every day sees some improvement in getting the plant in readiness for full operation, and gradually men and more machines are being transferred from the Rouge. Manufacture now includes machining of parts and assembly, but when the plant is finally completed, the entire carburetor from the raw stock to the finished unit will be made here.

Ford plans are said to contemplate landscaping of seven acres about the grounds and buildings, including mill pond areas, now empty, but which will be refilled when construction work is finished.

Two power plants will be erected, one on the lower mill pond and the other on the site of the old hydro-electric plant on the Huron. It is understood that specifications on the latter have been put out for bid, but on the former and smaller plant on the lower pond Ford will do the construction. A new artistic wasteway for surplus water is contemplated at the upper pond.

Workmen are making good progress on the 48 inch steep pipe line and a section of roadway bordering the upper pond has been torn up for pipe-laying. Traffic is detoured via north Main and Summit streets. Operations to insert the tube under the P. M. right-of-way are in full swing. A pit has been dug on the east side of the tracks and a shield and jacks will be employed to bore a path through the embankment.

Milford high schools near champion 1938 football team has made history, in that aside from winning 6 games, tying one and losing but 2, which in itself is a splendid record, two of its members have been listed for honorable mention on the Detroit Free Press All-Star football squad, a mythical high school aggregation picked by 302 Michigan coaches and scores of officiating football officials.

Milford boys honored are Walter Madison, captain of the local high's squad and who has an end berth on the team and Roger Ide, fullback. Both are seniors and will be lost to the team next year.

The Southwestern Oakland County League has three other players listed, including Burns of Holly, Mc. Macken of Brighton and Fournier of Keego Harbor. This is the first time that Milford football players have made the all-state listing, which is a feather in the caps of the boys themselves, their teammates and Coach Webb, who has concluded his fifth year as coach here. The 1938 team was headed for and regarded as sure league champions, until crippled by several injuries to team members.
