Home Tour 2016

Our Home Tour in September, 2016 will mark our 40th anniversary of this yearly event. We are starting early by trying to procure homes for this special year. At this point, we do have two that are committed; however, we would like to find three more. We also are in great need of docents that will work a given shift during the weekend of the tour. If you volunteer your home, we will contact you to arrange an appointment to visit your home and to help you understand the whole process. We are limited to 5 homes on the Tour each year, so it is possible that we would not be able to get all of the homes that are volunteered on the 2016 Home Tour. If that should happen, we hope that you will still be ready for the 2017 event.

There is nothing special that you have to do to host your home on the Tour; however, some view this time as one that they might get those projects completed around the house that have been on the back burner. It is a great event in which to show off your home to people that are interested in seeing historic homes or ones that have historical artifacts in them. If your home is chosen, there will be a few members from our Board of Directors that will meet with you and write your home's history to present to visitors on the weekend of the Tour. A House Captain will be assigned to your home and will work with you to plan the tour of your home and write the tour script for our docents. On the weekend of the tour, the House Captain and tour docents will be present to run the home tour in your home. You may make the choice for yourself about whether you wish to stay and help with the tours or just let the House Captain and docents handle it all. My home was on the Home Tour a few years ago and I enjoyed taking part in the tours through it. It can be lots of fun.

The Home Tour began as a fundraiser for the Milford Historical Society in 1976. The Tour helps the society pay for the ongoing needs at the Milford Historical Museum at 124 E. Commerce St. and to fund other events sponsored by the Society. The Milford Historical Society is a 501©3 non-profit organization. The funds made from the Home Tour will go directly back into the organization.

" I Miss the Dime Store"

That is the most common quote of Milfordites when they are referring to the Main Street D & C Store.

You could find anything you needed there. Yarn, toys, thread or craft items for the last minute school project your child forgot about. A big draw was the candy counter with all the candy displayed in glass cubbies. The things I remember most were the creaky wooden floors, spooky basement (it really wasn't that bad) and the wonderful people who worked there. Our own June Watson worked there for many years and always had a smile and a real interest in everyone she talked to. June still works on Main Street but now across the street..

I know a lot about the D & C due to my mom working there twenty six years starting in 1959, the longest of any employee. I still have the article from the Milford Times when she retired.

Among her many friends in town were Mary Lou Gharritty, Wilbur Johnson and Jerry Breen. Jerry would let my mom (who did not drive) take home a shopping cart on Thursday nights and bring back when she could. Now that is hometown kindness.

The store was renovated in the seventies with glass and metal. Out with the charm and in with the chrome. The Ladies at the Dimestore, as what they were called, probably liked the new modern sleek look.

Items purchased there are now considered to be "vintage". I have my mom's Roseville Dutch Girl cookie jar for which she paid under five dollars. During Christmas (my mom's favorite season at the D & C) moms would leave their children with the Ladies at the Dimestore, along with their Christmas lists for their families. The Ladies would go around with the child and find something for everyone on their list. You could never do that now. That can only happen in a small town.

The store closed in the early nineties and my mom came back to help close it with Mr. Jeff Dean her wonderful Manager who still lives in Milford. It became The Next Generation children clothing store and is now The Clothing Cove.

I remember in the summer my sister Sue and I would get the EVIL eye from our mother when we walked in the store. We would be wearing short cut off jeans, halter tops and barefoot. Yup, no shoes, no problem back then. Our mom was the "Candy Lady" and gave free candy to two generations of kids. No wonder she only brought ONE full paycheck home in 26 years.

The quote "I Miss the Dime Store" lives on and brings back many fond memories.
