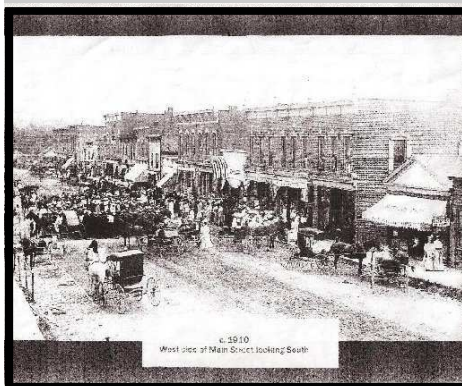

Virgene E. Wright, 1923 – 2009

We were sad to learn that Virgene passed away on November 21, 2009. She was a Milford Historical Society member and an active Home Tour supporter. Over the years she served as house captain, tour docent, tating demonstrator and graciously opened the doors of two beautiful homes to home tour visitors.

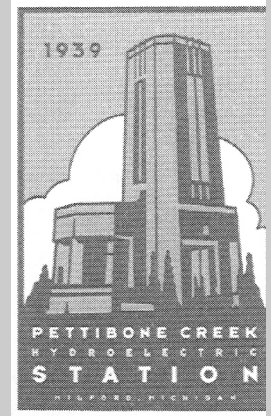
According to her family, Virgene was born May 24, 1923 in Detroit, Michigan. Virgene spent her girlhood in the Redford area where she attended high school. After high school, Virgene attended Nurses Training at Harper Hospital in Detroit. While in Detroit, Virgene met the love of her life Bruce A. Wright. They married in 1944 and were blessed by the births of five children Dorothy, Bruce, William, Katherine and Doug. Virgene was a dedicated wife, mother and homemaker.

After the passing of her husband in 1980 and the raising of her children, Virgene dedicated herself to volunteerism. She was actively involved with the Milford Senior Center, Milford Historical Society and served as a long-time election official for the Village of Milford. As a volunteer at Huron Valley-Sinai Hospital, Virgene served in many capacities including her knitting projects, fundraising; she was on the auxiliary board and was a greeter both at the Cancer Center and the outpatient Pharmacy Department. She even worked to design a bedside bag for patients to keep their glasses, dentures, hearing aids and other personal belongings within reach. In 2004, Virgene was honored as an Outstanding Volunteer at the annual Thanks for Giving luncheon.

We at the Milford Historical Society wish to express our sympathy to Virgene's family and friends. She will certainly be missed.

Glenn Rittenger received an award at the November membership meeting acknowledging

the many, many hours of work and professional expertise he contributed toward the Ford Powerhouse restoration project. The only original, in-tact glass block from the Powerhouse tower was



mounted on a base with a brass plaque thanking Glenn for his contribution to the community.

The Village Parks and Recreation Commission has included the Powerhouse in their revised master plan, indicating an interest in finding a use for the building. As such, the Powerhouse could be eligible for available grants toward completing the interior restoration.
