Mary Jackson House Update

2010 was a busy and productive year at the Mary Jackson house. With the generosity of many groups and individuals, we were able to complete some of the much needed work to the exterior.



Andrew Young from Boy Scout troop 72 completed work on the house to fulfill his requirements to earn his Eagle Scout Badge this past summer. During the month of August, Andrew and his crew scraped, repaired and painted the outside windows. The project was completed in plenty of time for our home tour.

In August, Historical Society member **Don Sleek** trimmed and pruned many of the trees and shrubs around the house and garage. Many of these trees were hanging over the house and garage causing a potential hazard to both structures. The tree pruning will make a big difference to the house and the yard.

Over the summer, historical society member **Andy Lynch** volunteered to mow the lawn.

Maria Moore Questers group received a grant in the amount of \$1,500 to repair some of the damaged wood work along the west side of the house. Work that was completed included repairing the door frames on the kitchen door, repairing the doorstep on the laundry room, repairing the wood along a couple of the windows, scraping, and painting some of eaves. The Maria Moore Questers group is planning an additional fundraiser to raise funds to complete more repairs.

Matheson Heating & Air Conditioning donated a much-needed furnace to the Mary Jackson House. During the installation, it became apparent that the existing water heater was not compatible with the furnace and they generously donated a water heater as well.

The house recently had its yearly inspection with a representative from the National Trust for Historic Preservation and received a favorable report. Representatives were thrilled to see the progress that we have made.

To each individual and organization that has donated their time and generosity to the preservation of the Mary Jackson House, we extend our heartfelt thanks. Your kindness has been incredibly helpful and has allowed us to be one-step closer to its preservation.

We receive many requests for information – either by phone or e-mail. One of the requests was from Nicholas Hill of Connecticut who wanted information on “**Findley Highlands**” from back in the late 1800's. We also received a request from Charlie Gragg who lives in Bloomfield Twp. He and his two children helped to take down some of the buildings from the Louis and Marjorie Jackson Bourns farm. That was the farm where they also moved one of the barns out to the Children's Farm at Kensington Park. He wondered if anyone had old photos of their farm or any other historical information.

January Program: The Toledo War – the first Mich-Ohio Rivalry

When Michigan sought statehood in the early 1830's it sought to include a 468 sq. mile area that included the newly incorporated city of Toledo on Lake Erie. Ohio's governor Robert Lucas and Michigan's Territorial governor Steve T. Mason were both unwilling to cede jurisdiction of the strip, so both raised militias but never exchanged fire. By December 1836 the Michigan territorial government was facing dire financial conditions and surrendered the land under pressure from Congress and President Andrew Jackson. Under the compromise, Michigan gave up its claim to the strip of land in exchange for its statehood. Congress awarded Michigan with the Upper Peninsula. At the time, residents were outraged with the outcome – of course, later it became a profitable outcome with the discovery of cooper and iron deposits and the abundance of lumber. On January 26, 1837, Michigan joined the Union as the nation's 26th state.

At our next general membership meeting, author **Donald Faber** will explain to us the engaging account of the Toledo War of 1835, a serious confrontation whose outcome established the borders of the State and the colorful personalities involved with the territory dispute that included the President of the United States.

Our evening will begin with a potluck dinner at 6:30pm at the Milford Methodist Church located at 1200 Atlantic St. A brief business meeting will begin at 7:30pm followed immediately by our program. All are welcome; you do not have to be a member to enjoy this Thursday evening with people who like history. We ask that you bring your own table service and a dish to pass based on the first letter of your last name as shown on the front page.
