I am lucky enough to inherit the PastPerfect software that was purchased in years past to record all the wonderful artifacts, photos and documents in the Museum and Mary Jackson house. I am adding to that two more computers and a server which will be networked at the museum so several volunteers can work together to scan and record the past of Milford.

What is your talent? Can you do woodworking? The door to the basement is warped and needs repair. Can you repair old glass windows with rotten wood? We have three at the museum and more at the Mary Jackson house. Do you like gardening? There is always gardening at both locations, and we hope to create a Victorian garden which will require some digging and planting, as well as fence installation.

Maybe you like to “surf” the internet...I do. By surfing, I found that computers cannot go into landfills. There are people who take used computers, refurbish them and then donate them to schools and non-profits, like us! You do have to pay for upgrades, and shipping, but the prices are fabulous. By surfing, I found free internet services for non-profits, grants available for small museums, and software donations for our enhanced computer system. You can volunteer to “surf”, fill our grant applications, or just come to the museum and help record the photos and documents we have.

Do you like to talk to people? Volunteer as a docent, or give tours in the museum. Even one day a month would help. Another way to volunteer is help contact members of the community – some of which you know – to help support the Milford Historical Society. Our Past President, Norm Werner, is spearheading this endeavor and has many wonderful ideas to integrate history and the present in events on Main street or with the Downtown Development Group. Norm can use your help.

Maybe you would like to go shopping? A 22 x 36 stained glass window would fit the door on the side of the museum, a 26 x 26 would fit the front door. A 36 x 39, or 34” round would fit the window on the staircase. How about wooden venetian blinds to replace the tattered green shades at the museum?

The carpet in the hall and on the stairs of the museum needs replacement. Are you shopping for carpet? Maybe buy a bit more and help spruce up the museum.

Perhaps the easiest way you can volunteer is to watch for vintage item – books, photos, maps, legal documents, clothing, hats, furniture, etc. These may be in garage sales. You might talk to your friends and find they have “stuff” in their attics. Help locate ways to record Milford history. If you have older loved ones – record their memories, or bring them to us for recording. Our new software includes a “voice-to-text” program.

All too often, the history of Detroit and Michigan focuses on the automotive or, at times, agricultural influences. Those stories fail to highlight a deeper history, from a time when Native Americans perfected a process still used for contemporary commercial interests: the art of harvesting maple trees for syrup production. You really need two things for maple harvest season and Michigan is one of the only places in the world that has both. You need maple trees and you need the right weather conditions,

You need two things to produce great maple syrup and Michigan has it: maple trees and nights below freezing and days above freezing to cause the sap to flow. I will add a third: patience.....Jeff Pavlik will guide us through the history, process, tools, and uses of maple syrup by early Americans and colonists in Michigan,(hope we get free samples). Jeff is also an author, avid historical re-enactor, and teacher of colonial style maple syrup. In his spare time, Jeff is the owner and baker of 'Sunflour Bake Haus' in downtown Farmington. Powerhouse news from Rich Harrison

U of M graduate students select Milford's Powerhouse for project.

The Pettibone Creek Hydroelectric Station website was recently contacted four University of Michigan graduate students studying energy systems. They are in a class on energy solutions and have a large analytical project on energy generation to complete. They have chosen to do the project on our Pettibone Powerhouse.

A tour was arranged and taken Friday ternoon February 10 with Nick Irish of Milford, Tim Dobson, Vik Linga and Guanghao Shuai. Notes and photos of the Powerhouse were taken and follow up emails have been exchanged. In a current email Nick and his teammates stated they have the start of a great project determining the feasibility of restoring the Powerhouse to power generation.

Richard Harrison who is currently coordinating tours and events at the Powerhouse is enthusiastically encouraging these U of M graduate students. They have the passion to follow this through and even have interest in a summer "Road Trip" to Springfield, Ohio. This is the home of The James Leffel & Company headquarters where the original hydroelectric turbines were manufactured in 1939 for Henry Ford. The company was started 1862 and is still in business and making hydroelectric turbines. The purpose of the tip would be to determine if one of the much newer and more compact hydroelectric turbines could be retrofitted to the existing housings.

We shall keep everyone current with the progress.
