


Reading is an enjoyable past time. The study of history can be enthralling. Add the popularity of collecting rare books, and what you have is an Antiquarian.

In 1812, Isaiah Thomas (no, not the ex-Detroit Piston) founded the American Antiquarian Society in Worchester Massachusetts. Originally, the organization's goal was to document the life of the American people, collecting artifacts from the colonial era to the Civil War era. In the early 20th century the society decided to focus its collection on printed materials. Today, the collection includes books, pamphlets, newspapers, periodicals, manuscripts, local histories and more. Their current goal is to promote ethical standards and professionalism in the trade.

At our May 15th General Membership Meeting we will learn more about the collection of antique books and tips on adding them to our collection. Our speaker will be Barbara Parks, a member of the American Antiquarian Society. Barbara will discuss antique books and how to determine their value.

Mary Jackson Eagle Scout Project

An Eagle Scout badge is the highest honor that a scout can achieve. Not only is this an accomplishment that will last a life time, but often results in a service that will benefit the community. The Milford Historical Society is the fortunate beneficiary of such an Eagle Scout project. Specifically, Andrew Sergent from Troop 172 in Milford choose repairing a portion of the Mary Jackson House as his project.

Before work could begin, Andrew was required to write a proposal for review and approval by our board of directors. Once approved, he had to earn the funds for the project, make a plan as to what needed to be done, recruit and organize the help and give the guidance to the workers, including adults. On April 26th a group of 15 Boy Scouts met at the Mary Jackson House and began work on the front porch. They began by removing wood trim that was rotten, sanding down the remaining wood, replacing what was missing and then painting the trim. The work crew began at 8 am and continued throughout the day with the last person leaving at 6 pm. The work is now complete and the front porch looks great.
