The History of the Bissell Family

From Dutchess County, New York to Bay City, Michigan, via Union Street, Milford, MI

When purchasing a new home, most people will have an inspection performed on the house; they will check the neighborhood and the school district, but what about the history of the home? When MHS members Kim and Scott Kish were looking to purchase a home in Milford, they found an 1880's historical home on Union Street. Soon after taking a tour of the home, Kim made a trip to the Historical Museum and began researching the house and the family that built it.



The house Kim and Scott were looking at happened to be a favorite home in the downtown Milford area. The Bissell – Jacobs house located at 334 Union Street and was featured on last years home tour. Although Kim and Scott's attempt to purchase the home wasn't successful, Kim has continued to research the family including meeting relatives of and recording their oral histories. At our May meeting Kim will acquaint us with the story of the Bissell family and how they made their way to Milford, Michigan and the fascinating story behind the Edward and Carrie Bissell home on Union Street.

Michigan State Questers to the Rescue

About six years ago MHS Board members discovered tree roots were breaking through the floor of the basement's northern room. Even though the tree had been removed many years earlier, the damage became more pronounced with each passing year and the stability of the foundation came into question. It also became clear that the concrete slab supporting the stairwell was breaking up exposing dirt. The Board began to seek solutions in 2007. The estimates to fix the problem made it clear that the cost was more than the MHS budget could afford.

To the rescue! In the fall of 2007 a local member of The Questers, Maria Moore #432, contacted the historical society. They were establishing a list of preservation and restoration projects that needed assistance. The Questers is an international nonprofit organization which was incorporated for the purposes of supporting education by research and study and to donate funds to the preservation of memorials and historical buildings. In the spring of 2008, Maria Moore #432, contacted the MHS Board and gave us wonderful news. They were going to dedicate funds for the restoration of the museum foundation and apply for a Michigan State Organization of The Questers grant to fund the project. In October of 2008 the MHS Board received the news that The State Organization of The Questers was proud to recognize and congratulate the members of Maria Moore #432 as a 2008 grant winner of \$5,000 for their project at the MHS Museum to stabilize the foundation.

Thanks to this generous support the MHS Board moved quickly to accomplish the foundation stabilization. During October and November 2008 the previous estimates were reviewed with the companies, the MHS Board and Maria Moore #432. In December 2008 and January 2009 the references for the companies were checked and Pro-Crete, Ltd. was selected for the job. In February and March, Village of Milford officials approved the work and arrangements were made for clearing the room. The Board would like to thank Duane Freitag, Brook Qualman, Brian Mooney, Jeff Spoor, Bill Crawford and Sue Gumpfer for clearing the room and breaking down the existing shelving.

In April, Pro-Crete, Ltd. went to work. First, under the direction of Doug Bohn, they poured a footing for a new foundation support pole. With the new support in place, they removed the tree roots, old concrete floor and dirt using a conveyor belt system. Next they poured a new concrete floor and stairwell foundation.



The final step was creating new stairs that met code requirements. Pro-Crete, Ltd. did a wonderful job. Their respect for the preservation of an 1853 foundation, effective and efficient performance and high quality results are to be commended.

On behalf of the Milford Historical Society, the Board would like to thank Maria Moore #432 and the Michigan State Organization of The Questers for providing the grant funds to stabilize the museum foundation. Their gift has not only helped to preserve a historical building, it enables MHS to continue our goals of historical education and bringing together those people who are interested in history, especially the history of the Village of Milford and Milford Township. We want them to know that their generous gift will keep on giving because it enables MHS to continue the preservation of local history and to share it with our community.

Elizabeth Frances Clark 1922-2009

We were sad to learn that Fran passed away on March 6, 2009. She was a member of the Milford Historical Society and a darn good docent at our Museum. According to the family, Fran was born on Christmas Day, 1922 near Clarksville TN. After her Dad's untimely death, the family moved to Prescott, Michigan



where Fran graduated from Prescott High School in 1942. As a young woman, Fran left Prescott to live and work in Detroit. She was employed with the Detroit to Cleveland Boat Company (where Cobo Hall is located).

She married Dewayne Clark (a former high school interest) in 1947 and with their daughter, Lois, moved to Milford in 1950. Fran was thrilled to be near her best friend and only sister, Irene. Fran worked several

years as a nursery school teacher. Later, she became the Treasurer for the Village of Milford serving in that position until DeWayne's health required warm winter weather. Sadly, Dewayne passed away in 1999.

Fran was a active member of West highland Baptist Church for over 40 years serving in many different areas of ministry. In addition to the Milford Historical Society, Fran was also active in Zonta of Milford and the Milford YMCA. We at the Milford Historical Society all express our sympathy to Fran's family and friends. She will be missed.
