2011 Home Tour Report

The annual Home Tour provides the funding for the operation and upkeep of the Milford Historical Museum and other projects sponsored by the Historical Society including student docent scholarships, microfilming of the Milford Times, the Mary Jackson house and the Fourth of July parade. This is why we greatly appreciate everyone who volunteers their time and expertise to the Home Tour.

This year's event was **successful**. We sold approximately 550 tickets and offered complimentary tickets to 150 docents and sponsors. The net profit from ticket sales equaled \$7,650.00. Our Home Tour Sponsorship Program grossed \$2,800.00. After expenses, the 2011 Home Tour raised \$8,886.30. This will certainly go a long way in helping us maintain and operate the museum and supporting the Society's many projects.

November General Membership Meeting Program: Vernor's, a Michigan Tradition by Keith Wunderlich

For the generations who grew up in Michigan, the familiar taste of Vernor's ginger ale is as unique as the taste of Sanders hot fudge. While there are many different brands of ginger ale, Vernor's ginger ale is refreshingly different. But did you know that Vernor's ginger ale dates back to the Civil War? The original recipe was mixed by James Vernor, a young man working in a Detroit drug store. James was trying to duplicate the popular ginger ales that were imported from Ireland. He experimented by mixing together ingredients, however, the Civil War interrupted his work and he joined Michigan's fourth Cavalry. Upon returning four years later, he found a wooden keg of ginger ale that he mixed prior to leaving. He opened the keg and found the aging process had changed the flavor. The result was a taste he had never tasted before, declaring it "*deliciously different*," a motto that is still used today.

Our speaker on November 17th will be **Keith Wunderlich**, a collector of Vernor's memorabilia for over 30 years. Keith began his collection with memorabilia from Detroit, but soon began collecting signs and trays from Vernor's—this led to learning the history of this Michigan company. His collection numbers over 2,000 items. Keith also started a club for other collectors and has written a book on Vernor's.

Our evening will begin with a delicious potluck dinner at 6:30 P.M. at the Milford Methodist Church located at 1200 Atlantic Street. A brief business meeting will begin at 7:30 P.M. followed immediately by our program. All are welcome—you do not have to be a member to enjoy this Thursday evening with people who like history.
