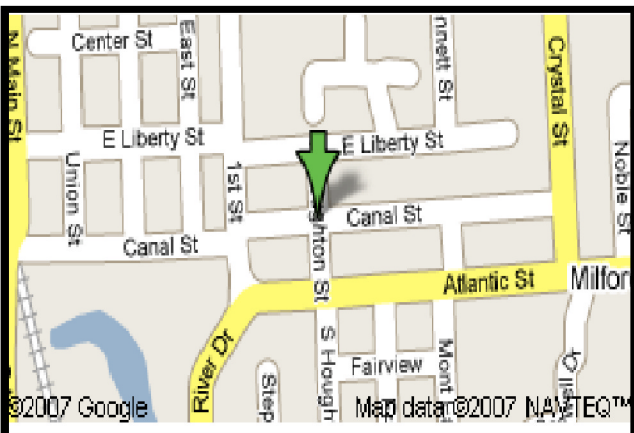
### *Home Sweet Home*

- ◆ I-96 take EXIT 155B toward Milford.
- ◆ Head North on Milford RD.
- ◆ Turn RIGHT onto GM RD / General Motors RD.
- ◆ GM RD / General Motors RD becomes W Huron ST.
- ◆ Turn LEFT onto RIVER DR.
- ◆ Turn SHARP LEFT onto 1ST ST.
- ◆ Turn RIGHT onto Canal ST.



The Mary Jackson House was built in 1872 and is the place where Miss Jackson was born on November 22, 1910.

Miss Jackson graduated from Milford High School in 1927 and attended Western Michigan University, where she studied drama and literature and graduated with a bachelor's degree in 1933. She taught briefly before deciding to leave the area and pursue her first love, theater.



Miss Jackson worked in summer stock and on Broadway as well as in stage productions in Chicago and Los Angeles before her TV and movie career began in the early 1950s.

Throughout her career, however, she never lost touch with her birthplace in Milford, where she regularly returned for visits. A charter member of the Milford Historical Society, Miss Jackson was instrumental in 1988 in raising money to rebuild the Oak Grove Cemetery Bridge over the Huron River -- a bridge that connected the Village of Milford to its oldest burial grounds.
